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How do United Methodists celebrate Epiphany/Three Kings Day?

It occurs on Jan. 6 every year, the 13th day of the Christmas season. The word "epiphany," from the Greek word *epiphania*, means appearance or manifestation.

The arrival of these visitors was a sign that the incarnation of God in Christ had been made known and was recognized by the heavens to the whole world, so that even Gentile wise men from the East came to pay him homage. This is an observance of great majesty, solemnity and awe.

An even more ancient Christian celebration than Christmas, Epiphany originally focused on the nativity, God's incarnation (God made flesh) in the birth of Jesus Christ, and Christ's baptism. After the late fourth century, as Advent developed as a

season of baptismal preparation in addition to Lent, Epiphany became associated with baptism. This is why we see images of the three Magi on many older baptismal fonts.

In many Hispanic cultures, Epiphany is a day of great rejoicing and celebration, often kicked off by a parade the night before in which people dressed as the three kings or carrying statues of the three kings pass through the towns and villages throwing out candy and small gifts to all around. Families and children alike look forward to Día de Los Tres Reyes (Three Kings Day) as a time for presents, feasting and celebration. Attending church services that include the celebration of communion is also common in many of these cultures, even for those

who may not attend worship regularly.

In England and some other European cultures, Jan. 5 is known as Twelfth Night, the culmination of the 12 days of Christmas feasting and partying. On Twelfth Night, many families gather in homes to celebrate with friends, food, singing and gifts. It is at these Twelfth Night celebrations that "Chalking the Door," asking God's blessing on those dwellings and upon all who live there, is most often observed.

In New Orleans, Twelfth Night begins another season of celebrations that comes to fulfillment at Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday). Epiphany itself, Jan. 6, becomes the kickoff day for that season, but is also often observed with a full

celebration in church, complete with incense, elaborate processionals, choral celebrations, and Eucharist.

Some United Methodists in the United States, who are not part of these rich traditions, tend to recognize Epiphany on the Sunday nearest Jan. 6. There may be a pageant of the three kings as part of worship that day and a small party afterward.


In celebrating Epiphany this year, consider partnering with a Hispanic, Latino or other congregation to find new ways to joyously celebrate Epiphany/Tres Reyes. In whatever ways you decide to celebrate it, remember at the heart of your celebration are the Magi kneeling, worshipping and offering gifts to Jesus, Messiah for all people.

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'Joy to the World': Accidental Christmas Hymn

"Joy to the World," found in The United Methodist Hymnal alongside "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" and "Away in a Manger," was not originally written to be a hymn, nor was it written about Christmas.

A Christmas hymn favorite for many is "Joy to the World." Across the decades, United Methodist congregations have enthusiastically joined in as, "heaven and nature sing."

What you may not know, however, is that the words to this hymn, found in The United Methodist Hymnal alongside "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" and "Away in a Manger," isn't about Christmas at all.

Lauded as the most published Christmas carol of the 20th century, the current rendition of the 300year-old song comes to us from a popular 18th century hymn writer and a 19th century music teacher.

A poem

The lyrics to "Joy to the World," first appeared in a book of poetry by English minister and writer Isaac Watts titled "The Psalms of David: Imitated in the

language of the New Testament, and applied to the Christian state and worship," published in 1719.

Each poem in the long-titled volume is based on a psalm. "Joy to the World" was inspired by

4 Make a joyful noise unto
the Lord, all the earth: make a loud noise,
and rejoice, and sing praise.
5 Sing unto the Lord with the harp;
with the harp, and the voice of a psalm.
6 With trumpets and sound of cornet
make a joyful noise before the Lord, the King.
7 Let the sea roar, and the fulness thereof;
the world, and they that dwell therein.
8 Let the floods clap their hands:
let the hills be joyful together
9 Before the Lord; for he cometh to judge the
earth: with righteousness shall he judge the
world, and the people with equity.

Psalm 98:4-9 KJV

Psalm 98, specifically verses 4-9, which scholars say allude to the Second Coming of Christ.

From poem to song

More than 100 years later, an American composer named Lowell Mason was responsible for turning a



poem about Jesus coming to Earth, not as a baby, but for the Second Coming, into a Christmas musical classic.

Mason was a talented musician and teacher who had the distinction of being the first music teacher in an American school, a precedent that set the stage for introducing music curriculum into the U.S. public schools. He also composed more than 1,600 hymn tunes. And when he discovered Watts' poem, "Joy to the World," he set its words to music.


Mason was influenced by composers such as Handel, Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven, often using their works as the basis for his own compositions. Such is the case with "Joy to the World." The familiar melody that we sing today is also known as "Antioch," which Mason named for the choruses borrowed from Handel's "Messiah" ("Lift Up Your Head" and "Comfort Ye").

Good timing

In 1839, Mason published, "The Modern Psalmist: A Collection of Church Music...," a volume of hymns that included the version of "Joy to the World" we sing today. It is believed the "The Modern Psalmist" was published near Christmas, which jumpstarted the popularity of "Joy to the World" as a holiday favorite. It didn't seem to matter to those singing the infectious, uplifting tune that the words weren't about Jesus coming to earth as a baby.

No doubt, "Joy to the World's" path to stardom was circuitous. Three centuries later, however, United Methodist churches continue to "repeat the sounding joy" each Christmas.


